Lots of animals live at the zoo..







The 1/2s had some amazing questions ready for Wild Lab Keeper Cath at the Melbourne Zoo on Friday:

How do the animals get to the zoo?

The animals in zoos are not from the wild. They breed the animals here in the zoo and some are brought here from other zoos around the world.

How many endangered animals are at the zoo?

We have about 15 different species.

Why do blue tongue lizards have blue tongues?

When a blue tongue lizard is feeling threatened by a predator, it opens its mouth very wide and the bright blue colour of its tongue can frighten the predator away.







Where does the food come from?

The zookeepers prepare lots of different foods for the animals, so for instance, the giant tortoise likes to eat salad, and so they have to order in food such as lettuces and carrots and tomatoes. Some animals eat meat, they are strong and powerful.
